Mrs. Icema Robinson is a neighbour of Campbell Berris. She lives near-by, in Wilmouth Town.

Family relations Her husband Robinson left her. He"travels around the and family history. world." He maltrests her, when brought by Police Constable to pay maintenance to her. She does not know where he is now.

She married him 19 years ago. Had 7 seven children, but 2 died. Two children stay with her: mexhauxandxamaxgiri a boy and a girl. The girl, Joyce, is 9 years old; the boy, Hamford - 11 years. One of her girls, Eda Robinson, is "taken as her own," by George Wiltshire. She stays "as in ward" with Wiltshires. "She is not yet off age. She stopsschool already. Another child of her, Vincent Rohisnson was at a poor house - with his bad leg." The Poor House is in Falmouth. "He is a big young man. Come off age." Matxaba He left the poor house already, but she does not know where he is and he it makes his living. The addax eldest daughter, Ivy, with a lady."

He was born in Wilmot Town.

Her mother was Mendez, but she died young. Her father
was Alfred Carter. He is no more alive. She does not remember her grandmother." I have it in paper, I dont remember."

She does not know how much land she has. She will show

the tax-receipt and we shall find it.

The land she owns was bought by her husband. He bought it in two portions: first one, and later on the second. The first one was bought from Stewart Carter, who was the brother of her father and the uncle to her. The second one was bought from Jessy Carter, son of Stewart Carter and her cousin. "It was all in the family. He bought the land from Jessy Carter good time ago. He bought it before he married. Then he bought some more. He bought from Jessy arter and

The house they live in is broken. "Broke down little grass-house." There is a whole in the roof and the rain pours into the room. "If a strom come it capsize." The house was built "good time, good time." She has no money to repair it. Someteimes people help her to do necessary repairs. "Good people come and put a little grass."

She is sick after being beaten by her husband. "I did work hard, he broke me down. He was bad man. He give me lick at this side. Licked me down." She was unconscious - a neibour came and put her in bed. From that time on she is ill. "I cant work."

Visit 18.10.47. J.O.

I met Icema Rebinson on the read and we went tegether to her place in Wilmouth Town. She confirmed someinfarmation which which was known to be confirmed and added some new details.

On our way to Wilmouth Town we met her sickly daughter, going with a basket and two empty bettles to a shop. She carried a shilling to pay in the shep. Is she going to buy semething for then? No, she goes to bring semething for a neighbourthey sent her to do shopping. It is not for Miss Icema and her children.

Their house.

We reached Miss Icema's place in Wilmouth Town. It is situated on the northern boundary of the quarter. It is a small grass-hut, with floor and one window. The house was previuesly on another pr spot. But it was destroyed and manxisxmoved rebuil recently. Almost the whole of the space was taken by a wooden roughly constructed bed, covered with a sheet. There was just one chair xinxing /it was rather a tiny short bench/ and nothing more. No table and no trunk to or box to keep family possessions in. A small triangular shelf was hanging in the corner of the re room with one plate, a cup and a pair of speens erxbesid on it. In front of the house there was a primitive "barbecue" on which some pots and empty tims were placed. There was no kitchen in the yard. A hearth- stone construction was made behind the house - there were traces of fire there and broken bits of pet indicated that cooking is done usually here. Miss Icema explaind that in case of rain the cooking is done inside the house. The walls and especially the that the thatch-walls of the roof were covered with seet. A newspaper stuck to one of the walls overe the bed adorned the inside of the house. The room was clen and nicely swept. There was no disorder inside. \*\*xbutxitxwasxratk\* On the floor, at the entrance into the room, and on the door black crosses were painted.

Their farm.

The surrounding of the house looked nice and pleasant, There were several break old breadfruit trees around the house and minutexpress the ground overgrown with the grass. A hadf bod of yams /yellow yams/ was to the left from the house and in the rear of the possession. There were altogether about 30 yam hills over there. Miss Icema explained that thexianx her land is not very big. Just 3 and 1/2 square chains. The yan hills were dug by her 11 years old boy and he also planted the yams. Mars Nothing was planted in bewteen, but there were were some sweet potatoe plants covereing the ground. To the right one could see some gungee peas. They were to young to bear any crops. The number of bread fruit trees was make given by Miss Icileda as 9. All of them are yellow heart bread fruits and she want does not expect to get any fruit from them before docember. Then they will last approximately till April and only in this season she has some breadfruits of her own. The yellow yam can be harvested from danuary. Now she has muxfood gets no food from her tiny plantation. Therewas also RUMERERS a tiny coffee grove under the breadfruits. Mususus h The land is not owned by Hiss Trit Icema. It belongs to her husband who deserted her and now gives no support to her.

Their family budget.

Miss Icema has is on the Paupers List and she gets 4 shi llinks weekly for herself and her two childreh. She cannot work - she is ill. All their expences are covered from haraxkwax these 4 shillings. Neighbours help her from time to time and this is how she can manage. She has no crops now and all the sum is spent chiefly on shop-food.

She tame was shopping when I met her on the read and she displayed to me the inside of her shopping maxim basket /it was a nice new round basket/. she accired it evidently quite recently: last time I met her on the read some three or four weeks ago she carried her shoppings in hands/. She bought the follwing things to-day:

Together she spent 23,0d. I.e. almost half of what she get as her maked weekly relief.

This food will keep her for two days, f.e. Saturady and Sunday. "It is for two days for me and 2 children. By Monday I have nothing."

She ussually spends on shop-food over 3 shillings waskyi weekly. Herxx/thx She gave xaxher the follweing items as her weekly food expenses: 1 1b of cornmeal - 5,5d. 1 1b of flour - 5,5d. 1 pint of oil - 2 or 3d, 1 lb.of sugar - 3 d. 1 pint of salt - 2,5d. 1 piece of mutten - 10d./apprex.1 lb./. 1 piece of fish for 3d. One sugar head - 3d. Together it makes more than 3 shillings and the remaider is spent also on food. To-day she bought seme beef - 1/2 lb for 3d.only. It was an ocasional purchase - the butcher sold it to her for a cheaper price. It was a bit of cow's mouth, far brem being fresh. Its smell peisoned the atmosphere around.

Their meals.

Miss Icema could not explain to me explicitly what they ext have regularly for their meals. Last Thursday children had only toa on the morning. Last Friday she managed to give them tea and I penny bread to each. She does not cook any meal fer the brekafast /noon meal/. Children have usually "a little piece of cane". The She does not eat anything for the MEMBER mid-day meal; just has "a little coffee . Last Friday she cooked food for the evening meal. She cooked a piece of yam given her by Mrs. Brooks and the bey found in the garden two sweet potatoes, which were added to the yam. Te-day - Saturday - chidlren had just seme tea on the merning - they did not eat anything to eat; as she had no mency to buy bread. New she will cook for them "a little perridge" - it will be made of corn meal; she mixes cornmeal with the flour and when she has any butter, she will add to it. She has "ne milk to put in". Tomorrow /Sunday/ she will make some dummies /dumbs?/ /they are called also Johny cakes/ made of corameal and flour. For the eveing meal she will cook a soup: "fl ur with the little beef". She has no potatoes and no yam. She went buy any yam far? "it selling so dear, I can't buy no yams". Last Thursday she cooked for the evening meal "a little two breadfruits". This was all. "xou havent mark every time to buy evrything." "Not everymerning can find penny to buy bread." "I never ate breaksfast -Said Miss cema of herself - only drink a littlecoffee. Though the day we eat no breakfast, because we havent. Only if it ceme to th evening we cook the meal." Each day it is "the same shop-food - cornmeal and flour".

Family possessions.

Miss Icoma has only one dress and one shirt: "The govern ment give it to mo; 2 piece - ready." There was "ne pay" for it. She has one karchiefyxfar head-kerchief made of calico. She paid it 1/9d. per yard.

The girl has only one dress. "It is made by the same Miss Carter her aunt/. 2/ a yard and 1/2 yard of pink. She /Miss Carter never charges me. She make it for 9d."

The boy / emrod has only one pair of treusers and one

shirt. She bought material for it paying xxxxxixxingxforxthex together 3/9d for it and 1/9 for the work.

Both children "have nothing to put on" when their dresses are dirty. They stay naked at home andak till Miss Rebinson is over with washing and drying.

The boy has one old cap /half tern/ - it was not bought, it was given to him by somebody. The girl's hat is also:"somebody given that."

She has also another new hat, with a ribbon. It has been bought recently. "Te-day I went to pay for it I shilling". The has cost certainly more that that. At least several shillings.

Miss Icema get to-day from the Nurse two pieces, each 1 and 1/2 yard, of thick cleth /which is used to make matresses or pillows/. She wanted to make a dress for Jeyce of from that. But Joyce protested: "it's too mit thick". She certainly

would not look smart in such a dress.

The list of their pessessions is completed with the a pillow and a sheet, covering the bed. The pillow is filled with the straw. The sheet is made of one yard of flanel /for 2/./ and 2 yards of calico /1/9d. per yard/.

Interview with the Teacher. 19.10.47.

Teacher instructed her to come mury day to them to have lunch at his house. She was given everyday a lunch, inxix but some day: ago stopped coming to the school and to the lunches. He heard she is ill.

Interview with Miss Eda. 20.10.47.

Miss Eda knows well Icems and her family. Icems had a child years ago - it was an outside child, a boy. She married a Deniel Robinson, who for whom she had 4 or 5 children. Daniel Robinson did not like his wife's outside child. He illtreated the boy. When he was 5 years eld, Miss Eda took the boy and he was staying with them. He was sent to the school and was the most promising pupil. They planned to send him to the secondary school and a friend of them promised to take all the trouble of fix preparing him to the examinations and fix-wask Unfortunately his mother and his mather checked this plan. One day, when Miss Eda stayed away from Warsop, Daniel Rebinson came to their house /it was still at the Mission House/, took all the boy's clothes which were being dried after washing, and persuaded the bey to go back back to the parental home. He had some goats and wanted the boy to look after them. The step-father did- not change a bit. He continued to beat and illtreat the bey. Andxannexmenthaxaftx Trama cameragain The boy ran to Christiana and worked for other people. Icoma came to Miss Eda asking her to take again the bey to her house "just to sweep the yard", but Miss Eda refused.

Robinsons oldest child was a girl. Her name was Ivy. She stayed with Teacher Byke, for whom she worked, butteacher Dyke complained that she was a kenkkankk nuisance. The girl ran way from Warsop to Christiana, where she was reaming about until she found a man with whom she lives now.

They have also a boy, who is syphilitic. He has lame foot, a cripple, and stays in Almhouse in Falmouth. All the family is syphilitic.

Icema was known as a very careless mother. Miss Eda remembers how mass once wix walking near her house she unexpectedly came across one of her little children, lying and in the bushy and dying. The child was left without any pretection; it was swellen and beaten by ants, dirty and stinking. It was a little baby. It died a few days later on.

Now only 3 children of her stay in Warsep. The eldest, Eda, is with Goerge Wiltshire. She is not a pleasant girl, always ready to intrique and tell lies. Recently she brought two chickens for the sale to Miss Eda. One of them has a leg eaten by mengeese. They refused to buy two of them, but were ready to buy the healthy one. The girl went to Wiltshires and told a story abunixibent was xaffan which made Wiltshires to feel offended. They went the same evening to Wiltshires, because they wanted to buy the chikken, and haraxbaxxirixx itaxxxx so they learned what was said by the girl. Mbs. Wiltshire said that it is not for the first time that the girl causes them trouble by her lies.

Miss Eda refused to give to Icema tinned milk to be taken home with her. She is convinced that the weman eats herself the milk. She asked the girl to come every day to them when going to the school or coming back and to have her glass of milk on the spot. The mi girl mantidaxyl had immir her immirs lunches with the Teacher, so she could come also every day to them. But in this evidently did not suit Icema, since the girl was stepped from going to the school in and to the lunches at Teacher's house.

Icema Robinson.

"Icema is a schemer" - said Miss Eda. They know her well in Warsop. She is laways going around among the neighbours and begging.farksamkha They don't like her. /khm people in Warsop. Icema's real name is Delila and she is known under this name in Warsop. Her maiden name is Carter and she belongs to Carters 'family. Her parents died long age. She had 2 brethers and two sisters. One of her brothers married Wilhelmina Carter, another either died or left Warsop. Only one of her two sisters is alive. She is married to Claudy Rutty. There was still another child string with this family: Isaac, her sister's child. He also left Warsop and is xx how in Christiana "knocking about".

Delila's husband was neither a good husband nor a good father. He used to beat and maltrest his wife as well as his children. He was imprisonned after having committed some theft and taken to Falmeuth. Hence he get his nickname "Dan Falmouth". He left Icema about 9 years ago. Nobedy knows where he is now. He does not give any help to his children.
