The house.

Corrections: Mrs. Thompson had 5 children altogether. The daughter from the previous union stays for 4 years aready with constable Powell in Warsop. The son from the previous union is in Manchester with Mrs hompson's father.

The house is one of the last towards Wait-a-Bit. Consists of the three grass buildings: living house, kit chen and pantry called "battery" (?) The house was built about 10 years ago. Mr. Thompson showed sticking amachete under the poles that they are all rotten. The house is propped by poles from the front. It leaks and walls are transparent in many places. Insi de the house is partitionned with a hoard wall into two rooms. In the first one there is a small couch, a table with very little "china". Over the bed a saddle, on the shelves running accross both rooms some raw leather, a scale, baskets (little ones made by daughters). Invibavaucuntaramax On the wall a row of straw hats. In the other room a big bed, a small one, wooden boxes on a barrel. On top of them some pairs of shoes. On the wall a lot of dresses. On the whole the inside lacks the displays of "niceties" but is rather better then many others with useful commodities. There is a small Singer sewing machine. Mr. and Mrs T. were very bitter about the house and the fact that they were not allowed to built a decent one.

Farm.

Mr. T. said he rented 3 acres. Round the house there was big plots of escallion. They sell it to higglers who take it to Christiania by bundles of about 2/- worth, Main cultivations are yams and bananas - very little cane which is a caracteristic for the whole of Thompson Town. Mr.T. has a mule who Family which he was shoeing. The whole family was decently clad, Mrs. (see west p.) T had shoes on. She is svelte very good looking. She says her daughter who is with the constable is 18 years old. It seems rather incongruous with the age of the mother as given in the

census. (She would have been a mother at 12).

Mr. Thompson's parents car to AllSides from Lower Trelawny.

Mrs. T. from Manchester. She herself staed longer in Manchester than her parents (Possibly outside child?) She went to school to Craig's Head. (In the census it is recorded that she does not read, and also that she is from Trelawny.) She says daugthers go to school, but all three were at home, thisday (Thursday).

Shopping.

Mrs. T. says she does not send to shop every day. She goes once a week to the chinese shop at Craig Head. Sends for little things to the local shops - Johnson's and Powell's. "Sometimes you need something for supper". She does not know or does not want to say how much she spends weekly for the shop.
