The House.

The house is situated on the Eastern periphery of Thatch Walk, some 100 yards from the path leading into Woodlands. Their homestead consists of two buildings: one living house and another kitchen. I stopped to erchange greetings with two women standing in the yard and started to admire pains blue plantings of ships and houses on the walls of the kitchen and the house. Missxxi One of the women explaine that the paintings were made by Mr.Calvert Brooks.

The family.

Is she Mrs. Brooks? No, she is not Mrs. Brooks -"I expect to be." She lives with Calvert Brooks already for about ten years. Had 8 children, but 3 died, only 5 alive. The eldest child is the boy - he is 16 years old. He is her child from another union, her's son, but not Mr. Brooks: Next to him is her girl - 9 or 10 years old. She goes to school - is already in the 3rd standard. She is Calvert's daughter as well. She i followed by a boy - 8 or 9 years old. Other children are still smaller. They came soon - 3 boys between 4 and 6. One of them cried and were tried to escape when older children wanted to bring him to me. He is frightened - Miss Victoria explained - that I will take him to carry him to the factory They always frighten him when he is unruly that they will carry him to the factory, where he will be put into machin together with tomatoes and "mashed up" or grinded into pulp. That's why he is so desperate about my presence. The boy finally escaped and ran into the fields. We continued our conversation.

Work in the factory. Miss Victoria does not work in the factory. Neither her husband. It But her son - 16 years eld - he worked the previous year and went also to-day to work at the factory. Last year when he worked the working hours were from 6 to 6 and from 7 to 7. All the day and sometimes all the night He got only 2/- per day. He started with a smaller pay - about 1/-, then his pay was raised to 1/9 until it reached 2/- this year.

It is much toolittle. Her boy is a big man and he must eat a lot. In the factory they pay only money but the give no meals. When her son works at the factory she must carry to him all the meals. Rhey count that 1/- is enough to provide meals for a young man like him, that he is left with 1/- after one day's work. It isnt so. Food is very expensive and what he eats more than for 1/- faily. And again, clothes are so expensive. She brought a pair of trousers which he recently acquired. The material cost 5/6 per yard and 2 or 3 yards are needed for a pair of trousers. Marking Life is very hard here for poor people.

Her family history.

y. She was not born in kkrkirrhathx Bull Savannah. She came here from Tryall, where her father and her family live. She stayed with her father before she came here and joined Mr. Calvert Brooks. Her father is a farmer.

Ealvert Brokks' family history. His house and his land.

Her husband - Mr. Calvert Brooks - was born here.
He is a bastard child of the late husband of Henrietta
Brooks - the house we visited yesterday. As a bastard
chuld he did not get any land from his father. His father
died and left all the land undivided. The familyland is
now owned by his father's wife and his "mother-in-law"
- Mrs. Henrietta Brooks. He works on the family land, with
his lawful brothers - Arthur and Alexander. He expects that
when his mother-in-law will die, he will get same a portion
of his fathers late father's land.

The land around his homestead was bought by him. There re is 3/4 acre of land around the house. She does not know where the house and the kitchen were built. When she came from Tryall to live with Calvert Brooks knowwere kiraking as they are

now.

heir farm.

They don't keep any cow. Just a couple of goats, a when sheep and some "piggies". They Mr. Clavert planted some tomatoes this year, but the drought came and the plants were burnt. They wait for the rain to repeat the planting. It is very hard to them - they have no water, no water tank. If they need water they must beg their neighbours. The land is not fertile enough here in Thatch Walk.

Asking for help.

At the end of my stay Miss Victoria asked me whether I will be able to help them. Perhaps with water - they make need water and they have no means to provide it. Also with the house. Their house is so tiny - one room only for all the family. If it would be possible to get some help to build a bigger and better house. Some people are able to manage, other people are not. Those who cannot manage themselves need help. When I left the yard Txhaxard children started to shout from a distance easking me money.

His farm in 1942.
