She became rather peeved after some minutes of running about, and began to cry; she came to her mother, crying as she came; she seemed to be get her moth r's sympathy; her mother took her between her knees, fondled her, and remarked that she was crying because she wanted to sleep. Friday,23.7.48. Ed. F. Joan took a can with some water in it from the kitchen table, and then hunted for a spoon. She found a spoon and began to drink the water with the spoon. Her mothe told her she would let me "beat the batty," (batty=buttocks) if she would not cease playing with the water. The child said -"No," and continued to drink from the can with the spoon.

The child then told Ida, -"Tell mi daddy to sen' rum come." Ida and Vera laughed. The child took up a basket and put it oh her head, saying as she did so -"Mi a go a bay;" i.e. I am going to the Bay. She walked some distance away from the kitchen, and sat. Vera called out to her -"Sing down in my heart for the gentleman;" The child sang:

"Joy, joy, down in my heart"....
broke off there, threw back her head and laughed. She came back to the kitchen, where she nestled herself a against Ida. Ida began to remove some burs from her head. Vera remarked that the child's hair needed combing, but that it was also dirty, and would have to be washed before it could be combed.

Joan broke away from Ida, went to the kitchen table from which she removed 2 knives. She went towards Ida with the knives; Ida took them away. Joan began to cry; Vera told her then -"A going to tell Daddy;" She asked the child -"Tell him?" The child said - "No."

Vera said compensatingly then: -"Sweetie-Pie, don't rude y'u know! Good baby don't rude y'u know!" The child asked for some water thus: -"Mi want some water! It said that plaintively. 'era got a tin can, flipped it full from a bucket standing on the kitchen/and handed the can to the child. The child took the can without saying thanks. Vera asked her: -What y'u sey? The child replied promptly -"Thanks."

The child continued to play with the water; it took some of the water in its mouth, and then squirted it on the kitchen floor.

Vera sold the child: - "Show the gentleman how Poto dance The child turned round and round jumping the while." Poto" Vera explained, is Caletus Simpson the blind man.

she was about 11, and was in 2nd book. She returned to Bull Savannah where she shared house with Rachel Powell her grand mother. She attended the Bull Savannah School then, till she was 14, and in 3rd book. She left and went to Stony Hill then.

She was adopted by a Mr. and Mrs. Thompson at Stony Hill. They sent her to the Stony Hill Elementary school. he left this school when she was 15 and in 5th book.

them Powell, Called Aunt Zale, was asked to get/a school-girl, by the Thompsons of Stony Hill. Veza had not met the Thompson's till she went to Stony Hill. The Thompson's treated her nicely.

She left the Thompson's "because mi grand mother sen' an' tek mi back," for reasons she does not know. She had been quite contented with staying at Mr. and Mrs. Thompson's, because mi never find no fault with them, but a was glad to come home back taxthx all the same.

On her return home, Vera stayed with her Grand mother Mrs. Rachel Powell. She used to help her grand mother to do the housework. She added -"She, (her grand mother) usual buy cassava make bammy, an mi go to the market an sell it."

Her first Boy Friend

Earnest Powell for whom she now has 3 children, was her first boy friend. By boy friend she means xx a male with whom she is having intimate sex relations. She had used to see "plenty fellows, an' them talk to mi, but it was not anything like that."

Earnest was the first man she had sex relations with. She does not know how old she was when she first met him, -"but it is ll years now since I an' him was friends."

The interview concluded here because Ida seemed reluctant to talk in Ida's presence. Ida had been absent while she (Vera) told about her boy friend, but had returned at the point where the talk terminated.

I remarked that the heat of the sun made me sleepy. Ida observed that my eyes were red and that I needed some one to hug-up and go to sleep.

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Interview with Vera Ward.

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Wednesday, with whom she had been fri having intimate relations July ,1948 for many years, was going to marry Joyce his present wife. She did not say why she was not vexed; are she implied that she was not awar resentful even.

Obviously, however, she was not keen on being interviewed on the subject: She seemed glad km for an excuse to break away. This came when Joan her 2 year old man daugh ter asked for water.

Child Observation:

Joan's mother was combing her hair. xharxak Vera sat on a box, while the child stood between her legs. As soon as Joan saw me she said: -"Nama, Mr. F. a come." As soon as I had got in theer immediate presence, the child drew my attention to the fact she was wearing a pair of shoes. She seemed rather proud of her shoes. -of the fact she was wearing shoes. She said also told me that she it was who had brought the box he r mother was then sitting on. She seemed proud in having been able to do that also.

She looked at her mother who has a wart on her rig t eye. She said to her mother: -"Numma, who juk y'u dey?"-i.e., who stuck you there? Vera replied -"One-man;" -i.e., a man did it. The child asked then -"A Sweetheart noh?" (noh -is it not).

Vera said it was not Sweetheart who had had stuck her, and asked the child - "Who is Sweetheart?" Jaon said - "A Dadda (-i.e. it is my father.)

Joan had a bruise on her nose which her mother afterwards explained, she had got when she bumped the nose
into something. Pointing towards the child's nose,
Vera asked -"A who juk y'u pon fi y'u nose? (-i.e.
who has stick you on your nose?) The child
replied -"A Sweetheart!" Vera asked ag-im next -"A
who a fi y'u sweetheart?" (that is who is your sweethear
The child said -"him down dey so;" she pointed towards
Thatch Walk.

Vera s attitude to the child:

Vera kept on laughing throughout the above conversation. The child seemed to find encouragement in this attitude Vera set her at arms length, and surveyed her admiringly after she had finished combing her hair.

The child seemed to be happy. Vera hept fondling her and making quiet and endearing remarks to her
