> Mr. Charles inherited the home site lands, and 5 acre of the land from Bre nut Woods from his father. The Old Top holding of 21 acres was also inherited from his father. All the other portions of land have been bought by himself.

The lands around the home site, as well as these piece between Wintward's and Levi's, are worked by himself mostly; he allows his son Herbert to work a portion of the holding on share.

Other workers of his land on share:

he gives out all the land in Bre nut Woods "to work on the half," as follows:

Thomas Smith of Tadd Town -2 acres. TO

To Harvey Lee of Top Bull Savannah 2 or 21 acres.

To James Dyer of Tadd Town 12 acres.

Thomas Smith has been working Mr. Charles land on the half for about 5 years. This fact was recalled with some show of satisfaction; Mr. Charles added that Thomas has been able to earn enough from working this piece of hand on the half, to enable him to buy a piece of land of his own.

Childhood:

Mr. Charles geew upm with his parents, his brothers Daniel and Levi, and his sister Lydian, in the house in which he now lives. He was the youngest child to his parents, and as is customary in these parts, he inherited the homesite.

School: He attended the Bull Savannah Elementary school from he was 6 till he was 14. When he was a child children used to begin attending school at 6 and leave off going to school at 14, instead of begining at 7 and leaving off at 15

Childhood Ambition: He had a "liking for carpentry."

After school he was apprenticed to
a carpenter named Edmund Myers. Mr. Myers
lived in Exton; he is still living there.
Charles used to go to Mr. Myers every day.
It is 5 miles from this district to Exton.

CAREER:

Charles remained at Rearning with Mr. Myers for 1 year. He was about 19 when he left. His father, Charles snr, had made the arrangements for his going to learn with Mr.

In the Police Force:

Two years after leaving off learning carpentry (he did not say why he left off) Charles joined the police force. He joined up in Kingston. He liked the policing duties and the police force at first, but later began to tire of it: pay was too small.

He remained in the force for 5years 9 months and 15 days." after which he was passed out physicially unfit. He really was not unfit; he engineered the condition of his dismassal. He hit himself with a brick on his shin-bone, but reported this as having been done by a prosoner he had been chasing. He went to the hospital 3 times, and was finally passed from the hospital as unfit for duties, police duties.

After the force:

He returned here after his dismissal from the force, to cultivate tobacco, and some food crops. This did not pay well, and so:

He Went to Cuba: -"to look some money. Cuba was bright then, but work was very tough, conditions of living hard; the pay was good however."

He returned here after spending one year only, because the conditions of living were too rough. He left the police force in 1918, went to Cuba is 1919, and returned here in 1920.

Animals were horses and mules. These he resold at a profit always. He kept a mare for breeding purposes.

He ceased doing this kind of business because -"the motor car came in, and horse flesh did not value much

didnot value much again." Wexkadxtaxshiftxfrom

Bakes up dealing in horned stock:

The horse flesh market having declined, beganto deal in "horned stock. e bought 4 heads of horned stock -steers. He has always kept 4 heads of steers since. He kaspsxtham; improves them -fattens them for killing. This business has always afforded him a "fair profit."

His shop and store:

In 1936 Mr. Charles "errected a store." It has always been run by Mrs. Lewis. Transactions relating to the shops and cloth store are satisfactory.

His Marriage:

He married Miss Vie Edwards im 1920 the year he ret turned from Cuba. he had not courted her previous to his going to Cuba. "It was, a short courtship; I met her in April, and marry her in November." He first met her in the stock market which used to be at Junction. He made his "own introduction," courted her after.

Mr. Charles was visited twice on the same day; -in the morning and then in the afternoon. It was difficult particularly during the morning to talk to him for any lenght of time as he kept going to reliev his wife from the shop so she could go into the kitchen where it appears she was preparing meals. This happened in the morning as well as in the afternoon.

In the afternoon he took me into the drawing room of his four roomed house. This house like almost every other house in Bull Savannah, is rather low. There were 3 or 4 chshinned chairs in the drawing room. All were chairs of American manufacture. One was a rocking chair. There were 2 mehogany tables of stylish pattern in the hom apartment, one a centre table on which was a shaded kerosene lamp, and the other a table with turned legs on which were some photographs of members of the family. The flour was newly cleaned, and everything appeared to be in dust-free trim.

Sounds as if from someone in pain came from one of the rooms. He said the sounds were made from by his mother who has been suffering from flatulence for many years. She "belches frequently"-will be missed for that when she dies."
